15TH SUNDAY ORDINARY TIME ~ 15 JULY 2018

Our first reading this Sunday is short but very telling. Amaziah, priest of Bethel, tells Amos the prophet to go away, to stop preaching, because this is the royal sanctuary, the national temple. This is about the secular state, in other words; how dare he bring religion into it. upsetting people's feelings. In particular, how dare he suggest that the path being taken by the great and the good' may not the one we are meant to walk. It was not the last time this situation would arise.

Again and again through history Christians have found that what the world around them is doing is not what God calls us to do. The problems differ from age to age but the challenge of living God's plan is continual. If the world plays the part of Amaziah what, then, are we to do? The one thing we cannot do is to give in. Whatever the world does we are called to speak and live the truth. We cannot say that evil is good, nor can we do wrong just because everyone else is doing it. This means we have to accept being unpopular at times just as Amos and the other prophets were. It means that sometimes, as Jesus told his disciples, we have to 'shake the dust from our feet', to disassociate ourselves from what is being done. We can speak the truth but we cannot force others to listen.

This isn't a statement of superiority. Amos made no claim to be special. He looked after sycamore trees, nothing more. But he knew he was called to speak and live the truth, which is the call of the prophet. The official guild of prophets had become a means to tell society that everything was fine, dedicated to not rocking the boat. But Amos knew his call was to challenge society to live as it should. We too, by our baptism are, all of us, called in the same way.

That seems like a recipe for an uncomfortable life, and life of negativity. But is it? It is a

commonplace for us to say that God has a plan for us, for our lives. It is something we say to comfort and encourage ourselves and others, in time of trouble. But do we always remember just how comprehensive that plan is? In our second reading St Paul, points out that our calling, our choosing by God, isn't something trivial or temporary or hasty. Each of us was chosen, not merely before we were made, but before the world was made. We are intended. we have a purpose. And that purpose is for joy and glory.

Our call to live and speak the truth is a part of that plan. Because God desires that all that He has made share in that joy and glory. When we speak the truth, like Amos, it isn't a rejoicing in rejection and condemnation. We have to see it as a call to draw others to enjoy what God has planned, a desire for the good of those to whom we speak. To remember that we are trying to speak the truth in love.
